FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Foodshare's twenty-first year serving the Greater Hartford community was not unlike the twenty years that preceded it — a good news, bad news kind of year.

First, the bad news. In 2002, more people came to local emergency food programs more often. Programs from Vernon to the Farmington Valley, from Hebron to Bristol, and many points in between called Foodshare looking for access to more food and more money in order to meet the needs of more people in their communities.

In 2002, the face of hunger in Greater Hartford continued to diversify. We met two parent, working families who could not make ends meet even with two jobs, coming to the food pantry to get them over a temporary, and sometimes minor, financial challenge. We met seniors struggling to keep up with the rising cost of living even while their incomes remained fixed. We saw children having trouble in school because they are not getting breakfast, and children who get little food at all when school is not in session.

In the face of this bleak news, what could possibly be the good news?

The good news is you and all of Foodshare's generous supporters who have helped our work continue to grow and keep meeting people's needs.

While we will not count ourselves successful until no one in Greater Hartford goes hungry, we did see these incremental successes in 2002:

- Foodshare grew by 10% from 7.5 million pounds of food distributed to 8.2 million pounds of food.
- Foodshare established two new programs in 2002, both designed to get more nutritious fresh fruits and vegetables out to people in a timely fashion. Read more about our efforts to distribute "Fresh Food, Fast!" in the pages of this annual report.
- Your generous support of our fundraising efforts made this growth and these new programs possible. In 2002, the Walk Against Hunger set a new record with \$258,000 raised and the generous support of the community allowed us to meet our holiday fundraising and food-raising goals, as well. For that, we thank you!

It is the caring and committed efforts of people and organizations that make Foodshare's work to end hunger possible. Donors of food, contributors of the funds needed to keep the trucks on the road and the coolers working, volunteers who dedicate many hours to Foodshare's work — you are all the lifeblood of what we do. We truly mean it when we say that we could not do it without you!

So, I say thank you, from the bottom of my heart, and on behalf of thousands of families who are eating better because of your support. But even as I pause to say thank you, I see more of those families lining up at the newest Mobile Foodshare site or visiting their local food pantry and I have to ask you to re-commit to this vision of a community where no one goes hungry.

For, "When hunger stops, so will we."

MOBILE FOODSHARE'S FIRST ANNIVERSARY

Nearly one year ago, faced with the increasing challenge of distributing perishable food in a timely manner, Foodshare launched a new rapid food distribution program, called Mobile Foodshare. Foodshare developed this mobile pantry program as a way to take food directly to hungry people in the most dignified, least stigmatized way possible.

The community response to the initial Mobile Foodshare has been overwhelming. Foodshare piloted Mobile Foodshare in April 2002 at a public housing site in Hartford's North End. When Foodshare launched the program, it visited one site serving 75 families. Now, that site is serving nearly 300 people – 10,000 pounds of food, in one hour! As word of this program spreads among communities in Greater Hartford, the number of people served at each site grows. And as Mobile Foodshare approaches its first anniversary, it has already established itself at 23 sites in Hartford, East Hartford, New Britain, Manchester, Bloomfield and Bristol, Stafford Springs, and Vernon!



The communities that Mobile Foodshare serves are heavily populated with low-income people, many of who are on fixed incomes or have been directly affected by the downturn in the economy. Lay-offs by the state, in the city's hospitality industry, and in the aerospace industry have affected thousands in Greater Hartford. Many families on limited incomes must face the tough choice between paying for rent or buying food, and hunger is a problem with serious consequences for these individuals and the community. Which is why Foodshare is constantly seeking innovative ways to improve the health and livelihood of thousands of individuals in Greater Hartford.



Through Mobile Foodshare, Foodshare has developed a way to not only distribute more food to those who need it most, but to also increase the amount of fresh produce available to these individuals on a regular basis. Fresh produce is the most nutritious food we can eat; yet it is also traditionally one of the hardest items for low-income families to afford. Foodshare works hard to make sure that it can provide these essential products to families and individuals that need them.

Mobile Foodshare is also helping to foster a sense of community among the various neighborhoods it serves. Foodshare works in collaboration with the housing authority or one of its partner agencies at each of the mobile pantry sites. In advance Foodshare and the agency and/or housing authority inform residents of the date and time of the distribution. When Foodshare's truck arrives, volunteers, usually from the community, set up tables and unload 6 to 8 different types of food from the truck. Typical items include crackers, pasta, canned vegetables and tomatoes, sports drinks or juice, and an array of fresh produce, such as cucumbers, strawberries, squash, peppers or lettuce.

Mobile Foodshare has alleviated many of Foodshare's and its partner agencies' food distribution challenges. Due to the success of this pilot program at several different sites, Foodshare would like to continue to expand this program to regularly serve as many other locations in need as possible. But above all, the most important result is that through Mobile Foodshare, Foodshare is distributing more food to those who need it most. More individuals, families and children are able to have access to a variety of fresh, nutritious produce on a regular basis, improving the health and well being of tens of thousands of people and increasing the opportunity for thousands of children to lead a happy and healthy life.

PRODUCE PROGRAM RELOCATES

Foodshare's produce program has grown by leaps and bounds since its inception more than five years ago. In 1999, Foodshare hired a full-time coordinator to maintain and expand relationships with area growers, and since then, the program has more than tripled. In 2002, Foodshare recovered and handled over 2 million pounds of produce; a quarter of the food that it distributed last year! As we all know, fresh produce is perhaps one of the most important components of a healthy diet and lifestyle. It is also a luxury few on limited incomes can regularly afford. However, Foodshare strongly believes that the benefits of fresh produce should not be a luxury, but a basic necessity for all. Which is why it has been continuously working hard over the years to increase the amount of fresh produce available on a regular basis to the hungry people it serves in Greater Hartford.



Foodshare's produce recovery program has experienced such dramatic growth, in part, as a result of its new partnership with the Connecticut Marketing Authority. In 2001, Foodshare initiated a collaborative effort with Hartford's Regional Market. At that time, Foodshare was receiving donations from the Market two days a week. Foodshare hoped that by occupying a stall in the Market, it could gain more visibility at the Regional Market and increase the amount of donations it receives from market vendors. During the late summer of 2002, the program finally made the long-awaited transition to its newly renovated 3,372 square foot space at the Hartford Regional Market.

Foodshare's new permanent presence at the Market almost doubled the amount of food that it receives from Market vendors in 2002. However, the establishment of this satellite facility has done more than just increase the amount of produce it



recovers. Even more compelling, are the improvements to the way that Foodshare handles produce, so that it can more quickly and efficiently be distributed to the community. Foodshare's volunteers now sort produce donations right at the Hartford facility, instead of first transporting the donated food to its warehouse in Windsor. The Hartford facility has also tripled Foodshare's cooler capacity, allowing it to accept and store more donated food at any given time.

Additionally, through a grant from the Department of Environmental Protection, Foodshare is helping to address the issue of food waste in another capacity. Due to a need for a more efficient and sustainable means of dealing with spoiled produce, Foodshare is piloting an organics recycling system in cooperation with the Marketing Authority. Fruit and vegetables that do spoil are processed through an Organic Resource Recovery System (ORRS), which pulverizes the produce into a slurry. The slurry is then periodically collected from its holding tank, and used as an all-natural fertilizer on local organic farms. The organic recycling system also offers market vendors an incentive to donate their excess produce.

This collaborative effort has dramatically increased the amount of produce that Foodshare handles and distributes to hungry people in Greater Hartford. In 1999, Foodshare only handled 700,000 pounds of produce. In 2001 that amount increased to 1.6 million and in 2002, to over 2 million pounds! The addition of Foodshare's Hartford facility is helping to increase its visibility and public awareness of the problem of hunger and food insecurity in the Greater Hartford community. Through its partnership with the Connecticut Market Authority, as well as hundreds of other local farms and growers, Foodshare is helping to provide even more safe and nutritious food to more than 100,000 people in the Greater Hartford area, 40,000 of whom are children, each year. Foodshare thanks all of its donors for helping make its produce program such a success!

The Problem of Hunger and Foodshare's Solution

THE PROBLEM OF HUNGER

- 100,000 persons in Hartford and Tolland counties seek help from food programs each year
- 40,000 of those going hungry in Hartford and Tolland counties are children
- Malnourished pregnant women are more likely to have stillborn or low birth-weight babies
- Inadequately nourished infants and children are apt to have learning problems and more illnesses
- Adults who are hungry are less energetic and productive, making it difficult to find and keep a job or care for children
- Malnourished elderly persons are less able to prevent illness and enjoy good health.

FOOD WASTE IN THE U.S.

- 28% of food produced in the country – or 96 billion pounds is wasted each year
- Local taxpayers pay \$1 billion per year to dispose of wasted food.

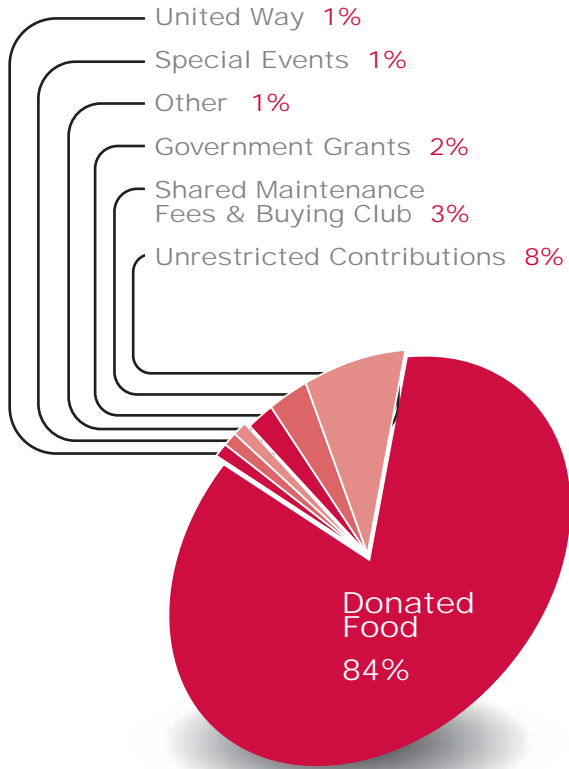


FOODSHARE'S SOLUTION

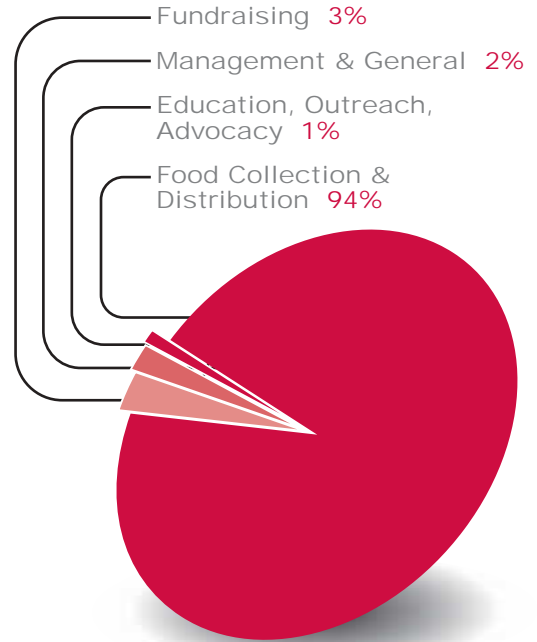
- Foodshare works to end hunger by saving food that would otherwise be wasted and distributes this food to agencies who serve those in need

REVENUE 2002



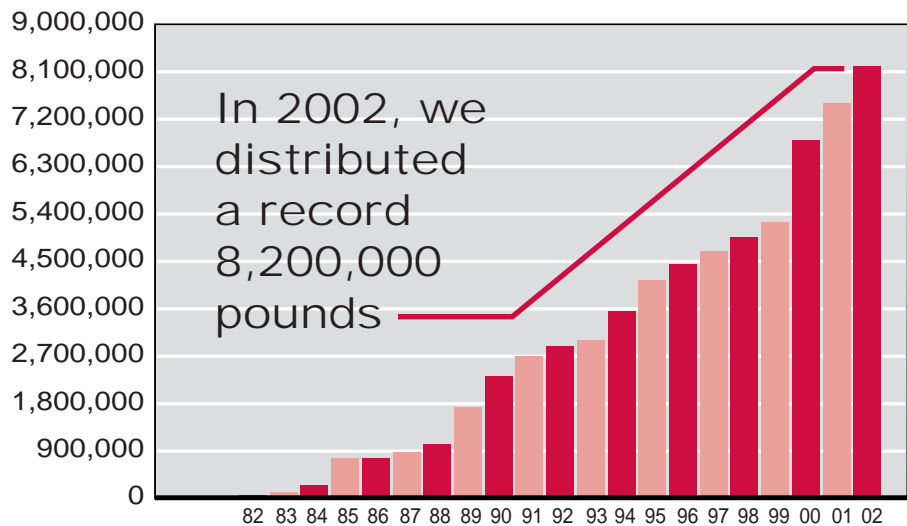
EXPENSES 2002

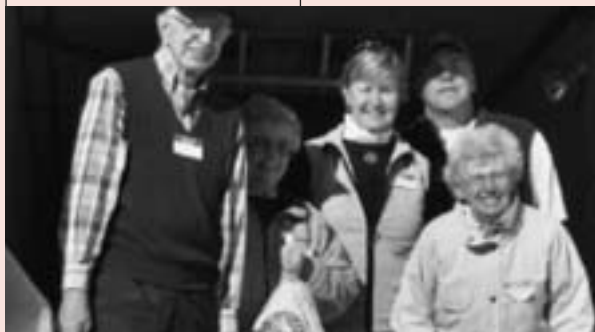
